Dear Parents & Carers,

Yesterday, we had the pleasure of welcoming two Assistant Directors of Education from the Trust who came and visited us at school. As always, we were keen to show off all of the hard work that goes into everyday school life. They had so many positive things to say about the lessons and learning, but the very best feedback is always hearing how polite, well spoken and friendly our pupils are —something that fills us with pride!

Safety has been a key topic in school this week and we were pleased to invite Nicki, the school crossing patrol lady, into assembly to talk to the children about safety on the roads outside of school. She talked about the importance of using the crossing sensibly and the risks of not waiting for her to stop the traffic. The children got to ask her questions about her role and were keen to find out more about the importance of her job. It has been raised to us numerous times that some very small children are walking significantly further ahead of their parents on the road outside of school and have been known to step into the road. We would urge parents to keep their children away from the edge of the pavement until they reach the crossing point.

It was the turn of Years 1, 2 and 3 to visit the Bath Literature Festival this week. KS1 attended a very amusing draw-a-long session with Duncan Beedie—author of the book 'Heavy Metal Badger', which is not only a fun story but is also packed full of references to famous heavy metal bands (Mr Low very much approves!). Year 3 attended the Magic and Dragons event hosted by previous Children's Laureate and award winning author Cressida Cowell. We are very lucky to have such fantastic events on our doorstep with some of the very best children's writers in the country. Thank you to Mrs Smyth for securing us the tickets!

As we start to notice a real change in the weather (please bring those coats to school!) Miss Parrott and Mr Miller have been sorting the last of the summer fruit and vegetables from the planters. We've had a bumper crop this year—especially the apples, which have grown in their hundreds! We've also had plenty of beans, courgettes and even a little pumpkin just in time for Harvest. On the subject of growing things, we heard that some of the children in Midford class have designed a very unique experiment this week where they are testing to see if plants respond to emotions. Attendance

Term Time Holidays

Whilst taking holidays in term time can be cheaper for families, it can have a huge impact on children's progress in school. They can miss key units of study in maths and English, and these are often not repeated during the year. If you are planning to take your child out of school during term time, you will need to complete a holiday request form from the office and return it at least two weeks before your holiday. We are unable to authorise any holidays taken in term time and this may result in a penalty notice being issued by the local authority.

New changes for 2024—Please be aware

"From August 2024, the fine for school absences across the country will be **£80 if paid within 21 days**, or **£160 if paid within 28 days**. This rate is in line with inflation and is the first increase since 2012.

In the case of repeated fines, if a parent receives a second fine for the same child within any three-year period, this will be charged at the higher rate of £160. Fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action like a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

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Please note this is a significant change from previous years!



If you're prosecuted and attend court because your child hasn't been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500."

IMPORTANT - FLU VACCINATION

Dear Parent/Guardian,

Your child's flu vaccination is now due. This vaccination is recommended to help protect your child against flu. Flu can be an unpleasant illness and can cause serious complications. Vaccinating your child will also help protect more vulnerable family and friends by preventing the spread of flu. Please complete the consent form (yes or no) using the following link:

Please ensure you complete your child's consent no later than 48 working hours before your school session to ensure your child receives their vaccination.

We are visiting your child's school St Nicholas Church School Radstock on 25-Nov-24

Most children are offered a nasal spray vaccine which is a quick, simple and painless spray up the nose.

The nasal spray vaccine is the preferred vaccine.

This includes details about the small number of children for whom the nasal vaccine is not appropriate. The nasal spray vaccine contains a very small amount of gelatine from pigs (porcine gelatine) as an essential ingredient to keep it stable and able to work. For those who may not accept medicines or vaccines that contain porcine gelatine, a flu vaccine injection is available. Consent can be provided using the link above. The Immunisation Team will send you a link to book your child into one of our Community Clinics you will then be directed to book a clinic appointment to have the injectable flu vaccine.

Even if your child had the vaccine last year, the type of flu can vary each winter, so it is recommended to have it again this year or they won't be protected.

Since the programme was introduced, most children offered the vaccine in schools have had the immunisation.
